Ordinary Time

As the calendar rolls into the summer months, the special days of the Christian Church slow down. We've had quite a run of them lately, Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Easter and Pentecost. The next one doesn't really come up until around Thanksgiving, when we celebrate the Reign of Christ Sunday.

We begin this summer season with the commemoration of Pentecost, where the earliest believers were empowered to carry the message of the Messiah into the world. There is a bit of dramatic flair to the Pentecost story; angels, voices and flames of fire. (Acts 2:1-18) That kind of stuff doesn't happen every day.

In fact, the Sundays that follow Pentecost are sometimes called "Ordinary Time." So, technically when we gather on June 19, we will celebrate the "Twelfth Sunday of Ordinary Time." (Here at Highland, we tend to follow the more traditional labeling, calling it the "Second Sunday After Pentecost." In some older traditions, the season is called "Whitsuntide," but I've never quite figured that one out.)

I like the title, "Ordinary Time," but it usually needs some explanation. The word "ordinary" in this setting does not mean routine, or without focus, or something not special. The word is derived from a Latin word, ordinals, meaning "numbered," or "in order." The Sundays of Ordinary Time fall outside the two main seasons of the Church, Christmas (including Advent, the Season of Christmas, and the Day of Epiphany), and Easter, (beginning with Ash Wednesday and carrying on through Pentecost). In this range of time, the Sundays are numbered, First Sunday of Ordinary Time, Second Sunday, etc.

One of the reasons the term is helpful is that it reminds us that God is with us even when life is ordinary. It is not that God gives us the best holy stuff on Easter or Christmas Eve, but that God has as much to offer us in the middle of August or when the leaves begin to fall in October. It means that the presence of Christ accompanies us when we get in the car to drive to work on Monday, or when life is calm, and everything seems to be running like clockwork. It means that the Lord walks with us today.

During the weeks to come, may God be with you in a most ordinary way.

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Mission and Service



Dare to Care Food Bank

Dare to Care Mobile Food Pantries - While we do not want anyone to volunteer for something that they do not feel comfortable doing, we want the congregation to know that the two Mobile Food Pantries that we have connections with (Portland Avenue and Grace Hope) are still running once a month. (Portland – **Tuesday, June 7** at 9:45 am; Smoketown – **Tuesday, June 21** at 1:30 pm) Dare to Care

has a finely tuned system where all food pick up is non-contact, social distancing is enforced, and LOTS of safety measures are being upheld. This has been crucial for the populations that we serve because it is allowing them free nutritious food in a time when many of them have lost income and are surrounded by uncertainty. We want to thank the volunteers who help keep our partnerships going during this difficult time.

Little Food Pantry - Highland has a new addition! Be on the lookout for our new Little Free Food Pantry being installed on Highland Ave. near the steps leading down to the basement. This outreach box will work similarly to the Little Free Library in front of the Weekday School except instead of books, this one will hold non-perishable foods and hygiene items for anyone needing it. If you want to contribute, you can stick items in the food pantry at any time. If the food pantry is full when you want to donate, you can drop off items with Rev. Megan McCarty and she will make sure our box stays stocked for the community!

Refugee Update

The two refugee families HPC sponsored this past winter are both doing well. The young Afghan couple, Habibullah and Shah Mohammadi settled in quickly. Habibullah, who worked with U.S. Security forces got a factory job right away, while Shah maintains their home. They attend a local mosque.

The Sudanese Urbano family of seven are also thriving. Father, David, and eldest son, Dominic, are both working at Master Brands Cabinet factory. The five younger kids are all enrolled in JCPS schools. The youngest son, Emanuel has learned to play baseball and the whole family was able to attend the game when he got his first hit. Jane, the mom, is delighted to be attending the newly re-opened STITCH classes. She's already completed two tote-bags and a blouse. The family attends mass at the Catholic church around the corner from their home.

From January to May, individual HPC Refugee Team members met with each of these families on a weekly basis to help them develop their English skills and to help acquaint them with their new home here in Louisville. Although HPC's official sponsorship time with these families has now concluded, we continue in friendship with them. Thank you to everyone at HPC who has supported this mission with your generous donations of gifts, time and prayers.

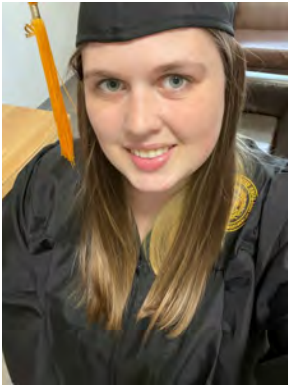

# Environmental Stewardship Moment

Let's talk about lawn care... not mowing your lawn as frequently increases biodiversity, reduces pest species, and decreases overall lawn management costs. We all know that summer is the time that our lawns get unruly. And, while freshly mowed lawns are pretty to look at, they're not the best for the environment. The emissions from gas-powered mowers and trimmers contribute to air pollution and mowing over native grasses and wildflowers reduces the nectar for pollinators. Instead of sticking to an every-other-week mowing schedule, let your grass grow a little longer, skip the herbicide, and commit to mowing less often. If you're not ready to completely let go of your mowing schedule just yet, start by taking a break from a small section or troublesome area in the landscape. It'll help the local plants and animals and give you an idea of what mowing less will look like in your entire yard. If you need more to convince you, here's 7 reasons to mow your lawn less:

1. **Conserve water:** Using drought-resistant and native plants will cut down the amount of water needed to keep your landscape looking full and colorful. If you think about it, meadows occur naturally and survive solely on rainwater and dew.
2. **Attract pollinators:** Keep the bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds in mind when selecting plants. There's been a decrease in the number of pollinators in the last few decades, mostly due to disease and harsh pesticides. Truth is that pollinators are essential for crops like corn, soybeans, and other vegetables. Pick nectar-rich plants like coneflower and aster (and let the dandelions grow!) to give them plenty of pollinating power.
3. **Help the birds:** Attract more birds to your property by not cleaning up as often. The dried-up stems and stalks from meadow plants provide easy nesting materials. If you can, leave dead plants so birds have plenty of materials to build nests in spring. To bring more birds to your yard, pick seedy plants like sunflowers and cosmos, or try some native grasses. Birds will love the convenient food source.
4. **Use less gas:** Everyone's heard about air pollution from cars, livestock, and factories, but did you ever think about what running your mower every week can do to the air in the long run? Since many models run on gas, the exhaust releases many of the same gases that cars do. Accidentally spilling gas when you're filling up the tank can also do a number on your soil and your plants. Mow less and you'll reduce air pollution. Or at least switch to an eco-friendly battery-powered option.
5. **Use native plants:** Planting natives is beneficial for the surrounding area. They naturally grow in the soil here and animals in the area are used to having those plants as their habitat. Natives also tend to be hardier and more drought-tolerant than non-natives.
6. **Grow in problem areas:** Since natives are typically hardy, you can rely on them to troubleshoot landscaping problems where you can't get grass to grow. Lupines and coneflowers are gorgeous go-to plants for stabilizing a hillside. Look for other erosion-controlling varieties to mix in. Have an area of the yard that is constantly boggy and drowns out anything you plant there? There are plants for that, too. Try milkweed and larkspur.
7. **Prevent pests:** Shasta daisies and rock cress are known for their growing prowess, but some of their strength may come from the beneficial insects they attract. Bugs like ladybugs and lacewings help to keep pest populations in check, saving your garden from a parasitic disaster. Many of the plants those beneficial insects are attracted to are the same plants that attract pollinators, so you can get two benefits out of planting the same flowers.

Letting native plants grow instead of mowing over them helps the local ecosystem thrive the way it should be, instead of stunting the natural order of things. Native plants are just as beautiful as more exotic annuals and perennials and grow even stronger since they are used to the conditions in your backyard. Letting your lawn grow also helps you be more eco-friendly in the landscape by saving water and reducing emissions. And the best part of mowing your lawn less is that the landscape will do most of the work for you.

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**EV Charger** - You may have noticed a new addition to our parking lot! Last month, session voted to install an electric vehicle charger in the parking lot through an organization called Evolve KY. The charger is now up and running and being utilized quite frequently by members of KRM, the Weekday School, our own congregation, and folks around the community. Our session's actions also sparked a new initiative in the Presbytery to get these chargers installed at more churches. To date, four other Presbyterian Churches have begun the process of installing chargers as a direct result of our actions.
