What a joy since October 2013 to open phone calls to our Highland Presbyterian people with this identification. I will miss it more than I can say.

Communities who watch over each other in love is one descriptive definition of Christian congregations. Parish Associate for Member Care is such a ministry. I have shared member care with our pastors; directors of music, children's, and youth ministry; administrative staff; deacons; Stephen Ministers; and our members at large.

I was a member of the Lutheran World Federation and World Methodist Council dialogue team (1977-1984). Our report to the LWF and the WMC, "The Church: Community of Grace," aided the establishment of full communion between Lutheran, Methodist, and some Reformed churches in Poland, the then German Democratic Republic, and Sweden.

Through the Lord our God's communities of grace all the world is blessed (Gen. 12:3; 28:14). The church extends grace to more and more people (II Cor. 4:15). The church serves God by serving with Christ (Mk. 1:16-20; 6:6-13; 10:45). The church has been entrusted with God's ministry of reconciliation, and God makes God's appeal through the church (II Cor. 5:17-20). As Christ was sent into the world so he sends us into the world (John 17:18).

The church is the body of Christ (Rom. 12; I Cor. 12). Members of this body rejoice and suffer together (I Cor. 12). The church gathers round and supports those whom life has left for dead (Acts 14:20). Members of the church bear one another's burdens because all have a unique load to bear (Gal. 6:2&5).








Environmental Stewardship

Jacquelyn Gwinn-Villaroel is a powerful law enforcement officer protecting and serving Louisville. She began her law enforcement career with the Atlanta Police Department in 1997. In 2020, Atlanta promoted her to the rank of Major. Chief Gwinn-Villaroel knew she was destined to become a police officer



when she was five, while she was watching Westerns like *The Lone Ranger*. Louisville Mayor Craig Greenburg selected Gwinn-Villaroel to become Louisville's permanent police chief on July 20, 2023. During her tenure as Interim Chief, she created new initiatives including, but not limited to: continuous work of implementing police reforms, establishing the Non-fatal Shooting Squad, implementing the Stop the Violence Community Outreach Program and expanding of the Louisville Metro Police Activities League. Chief Gwinn -Villaroel earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice and a Master's Degree in Public Safety Administration. As an ordained pastor, Chief Gwinn-Villaroel is passionate about community engagement and being a servant leader in her capacity as a law enforcement officer, as well as an executive police manager. She attributes her strong faith to her father the late Reverend Macon Gwinn, Sr., Pastor of First Gethsemane Baptist Church, Atlanta. She is a wife, mother and founder and Senior Pastor of Unstoppable Praise Ministries in Atlanta.
